Pupil Premium report 2017-18

The Pupil Premium is additional funding given to schools to ensure that children from disadvantaged backgrounds overcome barriers to learning and make good progress. The funding is allocated to pupils from Reception to Y11 who are eligible for free school meals (FSM), are looked after or have parents currently in the Armed Forces. It also includes pupils eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years. The amount of funding the school gets depends on the number of pupils registered for free school meals and the number of children who are looked after.
