ATTENDANCE & PUNCTUALITY

We are pleased to share that our attendance has been improving over the past year, and we're proud to say that our weekly figures have often been in line with or better than the national average. This is a fantastic achievement, and we want to say a big thank you to all our parents and carers for your continued support in helping us improve attendance across the school.

Each week, we celebrate good attendance in school, and we'd like to give a special mention to the following classes who have achieved 100% attendance at least once this half term - a brilliant effort!



As we continue to focus on attendance, we are also placing a strong emphasis on punctuality. We firmly believe that every minute counts, and arriving on time helps children start their day calmly and ready to learn.

PUNCTUALITY

Our doors open at 8:45am for a soft start, and ideally, all children should arrive as close to this time as possible. The doors close at 9:00am for registration - arrival after this time is recorded as late. We understand that traffic and parking can be difficult in the mornings, so we encourage families to leave earlier where possible, and consider parking a short distance away and walking.

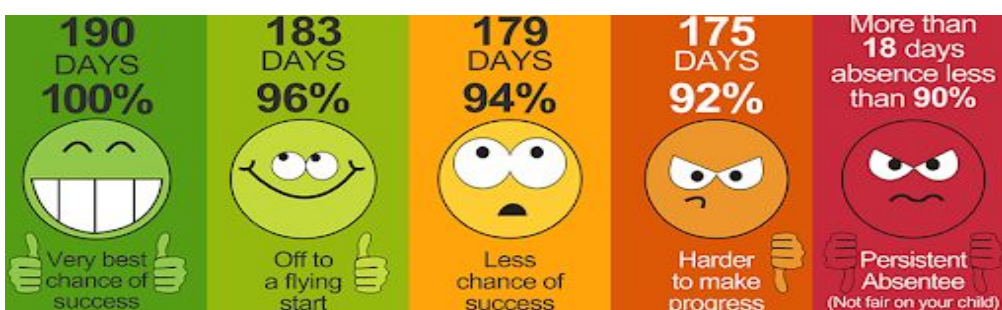
The same expectations apply at the end of the day. It is the responsibility of parents and carers to ensure children are collected on time. Please note that school finishes at 3:15pm for some classes and 3:30pm for others.

We will continue to monitor punctuality and will contact families where lateness is a recurring issue. Thank you again for working with us to make sure your child gets the best possible start to their day and their learning.

Year R

This week in Reception we have been learning all about the signs of Autumn. We have been out on an Autumn walk around school to see what has changed for Autumn. We then explored Autumn objects on our tuff tray.

We have also learnt all about colour mixing this week. We have explored how to make new colours from red, blue and yellow.

In Maths, we have worked hard on measure. We used the words 'small', 'big', 'smaller', and 'bigger' to compare objects and order them by size.

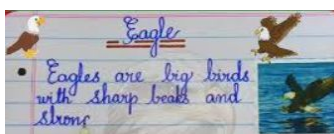


Year 1

Last Friday, we went to visit our local church called St Peter's Church. The children saw how it looks and discussed a creation story.



In English, we have been writing a fact file about owls and eagles. We wrote what do they look like, what do they eat and when they hunt.



In PE, we are focusing on gymnastic and children were learning to tense their muscles when performing tuck, pike, star and straight shape.

Year 2

In English, the children were inspired by The Journey Home and wrote their own versions of the story, full of imagination and adventure.

Linked to this, we have been learning about different habitats and the animals that live in them. The children have designed their very own habitat dioramas, which they'll be creating later this week – we can't wait to see their wonderful designs come to life!




We have also explored the history of transport, discovering how travel has changed from horse-drawn carriages to rockets, before designing their own amazing transport for the future.

Year 3

Year 3 pupils have continued to demonstrate great enthusiasm in their learning and recently took part in European Languages Day- Cultural Celebration Day. The children came to school in non-uniform; dressed in clothes that represent their culture and engaged in a range of enriching activities focused on the language chosen by their class:

- **Chestnuts** explored Spanish, 
- **Acorns** learned about German, and 
- **Pinecones** took part in Italian-themed activities. 



Year 3 had fantastic time during Fossil workshop last Friday. The children even had a chance to create their own fossils using clay.



Year 4

Year 4 had great fun celebrating **European Day**, and each class had the opportunity to explore a different country.

Oak Class focused on **Latvia**. The children enjoyed learning some key Latvian phrases such as how to say 'hello' and 'goodbye'. They also got creative by making beautiful traditional ornaments called *Puzuri*.

Ash Class explored **Lithuania**. They learned a traditional Lithuanian nursery rhyme and took part in a hands-on art activity, creating intricate paper patterns inspired by Lithuanian folk designs.

Beech Class turned their attention to **France**. The class learned interesting facts about the country, tested their knowledge with a quiz, and produced stunning artwork inspired by Claude Monet.

In history, the children learned about ancient Chinese culture and traditions, including the fascinating use of oracle bones as a form of communication with ancestors and deities. To deepen their understanding, they created their own oracle bones out of clay, carefully inscribing them with symbols and questions, just as the Shang people did thousands of years ago.

Year 5

In history, the children have been challenged to design and build 3D models of a Maya city state. This has been a three day project beginning with creating a prototype.



The final models were then organized into model city states. Finally, the children experienced what cacao tastes like before it is made into chocolate. Most of the children were not impressed with the taste as it was very bitter!

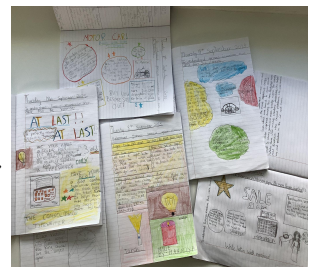


Year 6

In art and design, the children have analysed how art can explore the concept of self. They have identified common themes within different artworks and created a sculpture out of clay that shows the use of art to express themselves.



In history, the children have been learning all about the Victorian era. They have explored what life was like during Queen Victoria's reign and have particularly focused on the incredible inventions that emerged during this period. To showcase their learning, the children have created an informative poster highlighting some of the most important Victorian inventions, such as the telephone, the steam engine and the first photographs.

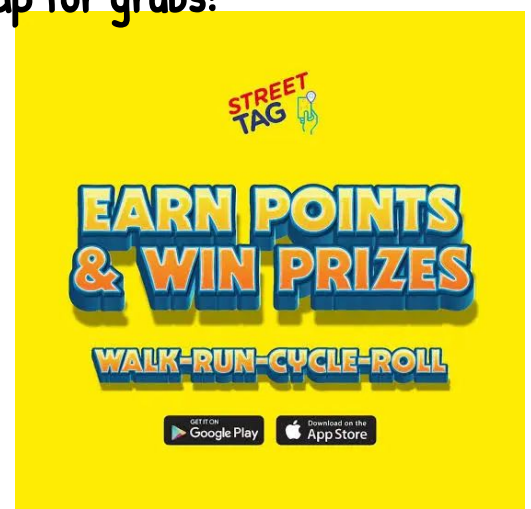

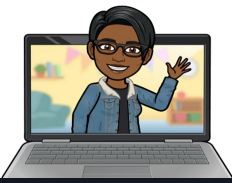

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about EA SPORTS FC 26



Our guide looks at the risks surrounding EA Sports FC 26 and our top tips to minimise them. This marks the third year since EA left the FIFA licence, and the game is mostly unchanged from last year. While Kick-Off mode is great for playing with friends and Career Mode allows players to fulfil long-term ambitions as a manager or player, Ultimate Team remains the main draw for many players – and it can get out of hand in terms of how much money players can invest.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AN ANNUAL RELEASE SCHEDULE

As was the case with the last two EA Sports FC games and the FIFA series before it, the franchise rolls out once a year with updated squads and new features. This can make it expensive to keep up with, particularly when so many dedicated players are keen to get their hands on the latest edition.

VOICE CHAT

Voice chat can be enabled across all platforms, meaning young people can speak to anyone they play with or against. While it can be switched off, some children will no doubt want to speak to their friends while they play. This also means they may encounter strangers much older than them, which can expose them to inappropriate language or behaviours.

IN-GAME PURCHASES THROUGH ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is the big draw for EA Sports FC, letting players spend real money on packs that they can open to build a squad of the world's best players. They're not always easy to obtain, and new, improved versions of players will be regularly added as limited-time offerings. Young people could feel pressured into spending money and experience fear of missing out.

SCAMMERS IN ULTIMATE TEAM

Ultimate Team is managed by EA itself, but that hasn't stopped scammers from looking to dupe players out of money and in-game coins. Some scammers sell their accounts, which is a violation of EA's terms of service, while others will 'sell' coins – something the developer is still working to crack down on. Some try to gain access to others' accounts, potentially giving them access to payment information.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

While EA Sports FC is potentially addictive, thanks to its fast-paced gameplay and mirroring of the real-world skill and glamour of football, Ultimate Team's focus on limited-time rewards and the lottery of winning packs can make it feel closer to gambling than gaming, which may lead to addiction and impulsive spending of money.

Advice for Parents & Educators

PREPARE FOR ANOTHER GAME IN A YEAR

The annual-release cadence aligns with the return of the school year, and can be a great way to incentivise good behaviour at the start of term. If children are applying themselves and preparing for a new year of school, or were particularly well behaved in the summer, EA Sports FC 26 could make a great reward.

LIMIT SPENDING

If you're worried about children accidentally spending real money in Ultimate Team, whether in game or on the EA Sports FC companion app, don't link a payment card to their account. Reclaiming funds can be a mountain to climb, and the dopamine hit of opening flashy packs with slick animations means one purchase can lead to another very quickly. It's also worth adding a prepaid card if you'd prefer them to make their own choices with their budget.

MONITOR VOICE CHAT

As in-game chat is open, be sure to adjust the settings in EA Sports FC 26 to lock it down. If children want to chat with their friends while they play, consider setting up a safe space for them to call, to allow them to play without fear of outsiders.

BE VIGILANT

As with last year, there are ways to keep scammers at bay. Ensure passwords are locked down, and consider using a password manager application to keep them secure. EA will never contact players through the game itself, so be vigilant with incoming messages, and block and report suspected spam. EA will contact players by email if needed, but they will never ask for usernames or passwords. Players should also avoid buying in-game currency from unofficial websites – doing so can lead to accounts being banned and could cost players money in the process.
